#### **HOUSE RULES HIGHLIGHTS**

Resident's agree that the following House Rules and any additional reasonable rules and regulations subsequently adopted by Landlord/Owner of which Resident receives reasonable notice shall be part of this lease and shall be incorporated by reference herein. Resident further agrees that any failure by Resident, or failure by others on the property with the consent of resident, to abide fully by such rules and regulations may be deemed by Landlord/Owner as a default by Resident and breach of this lease:



#### **Clarence "Buddy Moore**



Over the years I have intervened numerous Friendship Terrace residents for the Friendship Terrace monthly newsletter and I would like to thank all those who have had their profiles published. However, it was brought to my attention that my profile has never been featured. So, below is my current unabridged "confession."

I was born May 8, 1937 in Orangeburg, South Carolina. My parents left South Carolina in 1939 having in tow me at two years of age, an older brother age four and a younger brother six months of age.

At age five I attended Washington DC Public Schools. and made numerous neighborhood friends. My family would eventually increase with the birth of a baby girl and an additional boy bringing our family to a total of seven including our mother and father. My preadolescent years were normal and fruitful. My parents were both hard workers and provided the family with the necessary accounterments, including a new set of colorful attractive, encyclopedias.

#### IN THE SPOTLIGHT

My adolescent years were different. My family moved from the lower section of DC to the "uptown" more prestigious section where my life took on a new sense of excitement, a keen focus, an abundance of new positive friendships and a pathway to success.

After completing high school, I met and fell in love with my neighborhood sweetheart which after three years of courtship I became a husband and ultimately a father of two daughters and a son.

Prior to our marriage I had secured a position with a men's clothing store and eventually became manager of that establishment. While the marriage was financially stable unfortunately our nuptial agreement was falling apart right before our young inflexible, blindfolded eyes. As a result, in 1970 a court decision dissolved the marriage.

I was now in a state of disillusion and despair, blaming myself for the family's demise. However I was not to be deterred by this tragic misstep. After months of mourning and on the verge of deep-seated depression I returned to school as an older adult in pursuit of a college degree. Simultaneously I began creatively charting a path for my future. I secured a position with the United States Postal Service. Following five years of employment there I realized it was a well-paying dead-end job so I unenthusiastically resigned and secured a position in the Multi-family Housing Management Field, managing properties in DC Maryland and Virginia.

I needed excitement and a challenge and I surely found it in the property management industry. I subsequently exited the housing arena and was chosen to serve as Office Operation Supervisor for the DC 1980 Decennial Census. Following the 1980 Census I was recruited to remain with the Census Bureau and serve as a Survey Interviewer Specialist. My quest for knowledge and experience was high. I left the Census Bureau and entered into banking where I became educated on personal money management i.e. how to earn money and multiply it without risk.

I departed the banking industry and accepted an appointment as a Congressional Aide. When the Congressman for whom I served was not re-elected I became a "Call Center Manager" for a major corporation in the Washington, DC area. It was now time to concentrate on my private life. Therefore, after nine years of bachelorhood, I became a husband for the second time. Shortly thereafter a bright-eyed bewildered baby boy was born. What a thrill!.

#### IN THE SPOTLIGHT

Sadly, to say, after 27 years of a magnificent magnetic marriage my second wife passed away on February 10, 2010 with ALS (Lou Gehrig Disease). That was indeed the most despondent day of my life. Not only did I lose a wife, I lost most of my eyesight to an eye disease known as glaucoma. And today my aggressive, unpredictable glaucoma has rendered me legally blind.

As I meticulously evaluate my life I am somewhat in awe of my numerous accomplishments while occupying cherished space here on earth. My volunteer work included: Park View Elementary School PTA President; consumer member on the DC Board of Pharmacy; organizer for the local ALS Association (Lou Gehrig Disease); an elected DC Advisory Neighborhood Commissioner; a DC Commissioner on Aging; a member of the DC Multimodal Accessibility Advisory Councill. I also served in various Friendship Terrace Residents' Association positions, including President. I have worked in campaigns of numerous DC politicians. I also co-coordinated the 1988 25the University of the March on Washington.

I currently serve as a Board Member of the National Federation of the Blind Greater DC Chapter. I am co-chair of the Bernice Fonteneau Senion Wellness Senior Center Member Advisory Committee in Ward One; I am a volunteer with the Prevention of Blindness Society. And I serve on the Friendship Terrace Advisory Committee.

Creatively I recently seized upon the opportunity to co-write a three act play titled: "Do the Proper Thing, Please Ask. Do Not Assume." This play is performed by ninety-nine percent blind and visually impaired individuals and is receiving enthusiastic local reviews.

Finally, I must confess that one of my most difficult decisions was choosing a place to reside during my twilight years. Fortunately I had numerous choices at my disposal, including residency at Fort Lincoln New Town Housing Development.

However, with the safe, attractive, clean, affordable housing at Friendship Terrace coupled with the numerous compassionate, sociable cultures represented here I am thoroughly convinced I made the shrewdest decision May 2018 when I chose to reside at Friendship Terrace Senior Living.
